Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Results of Operations

Renaissance Canadian Growth Fund's (referred to as the *Fund*) portfolio advisor is CIBC Asset Management Inc. (referred to as *CAMI*, the *Manager* or *Portfolio Advisor*). The commentary that follows provides a summary of the results of operations for the six-month period ended February 29, 2024. All dollar figures are expressed in thousands, unless otherwise indicated.

The Fund's net asset value increased by 7% during the period, from \$1,289,723 as at August 31, 2023 to \$1,378,056 as at February 29, 2024. Positive investment performance was partially offset by net redemptions of \$27,582, resulting in an overall increase in net asset value.

Class A units of the Fund posted a return of 8.1% for the period. The Fund's benchmark, the S&P/TSX Composite Index (referred to as the *benchmark*), returned 6.8% for the same period. The Fund's return is after the deduction of fees and expenses, unlike the benchmark's return. See the section *Past Performance* for the returns of other classes of units offered by the Fund.

As inflation data improved, expectations for US Federal Reserve Board (referred to as the *Fed*) actions shifted from a bias toward increasing interest rates to a bias toward lowering them. However, the timing of the first interest-rate reduction was uncertain. The potential for lower interest rates in Canada and the US continued to dictate the price swings of interest-rate-sensitive stocks as well as small-capitalization and growth stocks.

Geopolitical tensions in Ukraine and the Middle East continued to create volatility for commodity prices and supply chains. Investor enthusiasm for artificial intelligence (referred to as *AI*) drove strong performance in the information technology sector.

Inventory corrections continued to affect hardware and broad-based semiconductor companies. Customers in many industries digested the stockpiles of inventory built up through the post-pandemic period. There were signs that this inventory correction had started to impact the automotive industry, which had not previously experienced declines.

Overweight exposure to the industrials sector and underweight exposure to materials contributed to the Fund's performance. Stock

selection in the financials and industrials sectors also contributed to performance. Security selection in the information technology and communication services sectors contributed to performance as the Fund was concentrated in holdings exposed to AI themes, which performed well.

Holdings in Trisura Group Ltd. and Fairfax Financial Holdings Ltd. contributed to the Fund's performance. Both companies were trading at depressed valuations and exhibited outsized earnings growth as a result of strong pricing power and higher interest rates. Holdings in Brookfield Corp. and Brookfield Business Partners L.P. also contributed to performance. The significant discount that these companies were trading at narrowed in anticipation of falling interest rates and growing earnings.

Broadcom Inc. contributed to performance as it benefited from its exposure to AI and its VMWare Inc. acquisition. Palo Alto Networks Inc. was another individual contributor to performance as the industry moved toward consolidating cybersecurity to leading security platforms.

An underweight allocation to the consumer staples sector detracted from the Fund's performance, as did security selection in the materials and health care sectors. A holding in First Quantum Minerals Ltd. detracted from the Fund's performance following the closure of its operating mine in Peru. Having underweight exposure to Manulife Financial Corp. detracted from performance as the company began to show progress after the sale of part of its long-term care book.

Underweight exposure to Eli Lilly and Co. also detracted from the Fund's performance as the company benefited from continued strength from its key obesity treatment. Another individual detractor from performance was Roche Holding AG as the company struggled with a number of product-pipeline setbacks.

The Portfolio Advisor added a new holding in Adobe Inc. The company could be a key beneficiary of AI, which has been integrated into its creative suite of products. The Portfolio Advisor added ASML Holding NV for its leadership position in lithography systems. These tools are critical in the manufacture of leading-edge semiconductors. Osisko Gold Royalties Ltd. was added from the proceeds of the sale of Franco-Nevada Corp. to maintain the Fund's gold exposure. WSP Global Inc.

was purchased based on its solid balance sheet, strong profitability, attractive growth and a valuation that reflects those attributes.

An existing holding in Enbridge Inc. was increased to shift the Fund's business mix toward more gas exposure and add geographic diversification. A holding in Manulife Financial Corp. was increased as the Portfolio Advisor gained more comfort with the unknown risks following the partial sale of its long-term care book. Thomson Reuters Corp. and CGI Inc. were increased to give the Fund additional exposure to the AI theme.

The Fund's holdings in Tesla Inc., Shopify Inc. and ON Semiconductor Corp. were eliminated. In Tesla's earnings call, the company missed on deliverables, which had largely been attributed to re-tooling at Tesla factories restricting near-term supply. Shopify was sold after reporting stronger-than-expected revenue and operating income results. ON Semiconductor was sold based on evidence of semiconductor inventory corrections in the automotive industry.

The Fund's holding in Alimentation Couche-Tard Inc. was reduced amid indications of weakening same-store sales and fuel volumes in other businesses, and a decline in US consumer spending. While Alimentation Couch-Tard has had slower same-store sales and fuel volumes, its success in reducing costs and expanding margins has contributed to strong share price performance.

Recent Developments

The level of geopolitical risk disrupted the global economy and financial markets in unprecedented and unpredictable ways. This has resulted in significant volatility and uncertainty in financial markets. It is unclear what further actions may be taken by governments and the resulting impact on global economies, businesses and financial markets. Inflation has increased in many markets across the globe, leading central banks to raise interest rates in order to counter rapidly rising prices. These factors may adversely affect the Fund's performance. The Manager continues to monitor ongoing developments and the impact to investment strategies.

Related Party Transactions

Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (referred to as *CIBC*) and its affiliates have the following roles and responsibilities with respect to the Fund, and receive the fees described below in connection with their roles and responsibilities.

Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor of the Fund

CAMI, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the Fund's Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor. As Manager, CAMI receives management fees with respect to the Fund's day-to-day business and operations, calculated based on the net asset value of each respective class of units of the Fund as described in *Management Fees*.

The Manager pays the Fund's operating expenses (other than certain fund costs) in respect of the classes of units of the Fund (except Class O unit), which may include but are not limited to, operating and administrative costs; regulatory fees; audit, and legal fees and expenses; trustee, safekeeping, custodial, and any agency fees; and investor servicing costs and costs of unitholder reports, prospectuses, Fund Facts, and other reports, in exchange for the Fund paying a fixed rate administration fee (plus applicable GST/HST) to the Manager with

respect to those classes of units. For Class O units, no fixed administration fee will be charged. The Manager pays the Fund's operating expenses (other than certain Fund costs) allocated to Class O units of the Fund. The fixed administration fee payable by the Fund, may, in any particular period, exceed or be lower than the expenses we incur in providing such services to the Fund.

As Trustee, CAMI holds title to the Fund's property (cash and securities) on behalf of its unitholders. As Portfolio Advisor, CAMI provides, or arranges to provide for, investment advice and portfolio management services to the Fund. CAMI also compensates dealers in connection with their marketing activities regarding the Fund. From time to time, CAMI may invest in units of the Fund.

Distributor

Dealers and other firms sell units of the Fund to investors. These dealers and other firms include CAMI's related dealers such as the CIBC Securities Inc. (referred to as *CIBC SI*), the CIBC Investor's Edge discount brokerage division of CIBC Investor Services Inc. (referred to as *CIBC ISI*), the CIBC Imperial Service division of CIBC ISI, and the CIBC Wood Gundy division of CIBC World Markets Inc. (referred to as *CIBC WM*). CIBC SI, CIBC ISI and CIBC WM are wholly-owned subsidiaries of CIBC.

CAMI may pay sales commissions and trailing commissions to these dealers and firms in connection with the sale of units of the Fund. These dealers and other firms may pay a portion of these sales commissions and trailing commissions to their advisors who sell units of the Fund to investors.

Brokerage Arrangements and Soft Dollars

The Portfolio Advisor or any portfolio sub-advisors make decisions, including the selection of markets and dealers and the negotiation of commissions, with respect to the purchase and sale of portfolio securities, certain derivative products and the execution of portfolio transactions. Brokerage business may be allocated by the Portfolio Advisor or any portfolio sub-advisor(s) to CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., each a subsidiary of CIBC. CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp. may also earn spreads on the sale of fixed income securities, other securities, and certain derivative products to the Fund. A spread is the difference between the bid and ask prices for a security in the applicable marketplace, with respect to the execution of portfolio transactions. The spread will differ based upon various factors such as the nature and liquidity of the security.

Dealers, including CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., may furnish goods and services, other than order execution, to the Portfolio Advisor or any portfolio sub-advisor(s) when they process trades through them. These types of goods and services for which the Portfolio Advisor or a portfolio sub-advisor may direct brokerage commissions are research goods and services and order execution goods and services, and are referred to in the industry as "soft-dollar" arrangements. These goods and services received through soft dollar arrangements assist the Portfolio Advisor or any portfolio sub-advisor(s) with investment decision-making services for the Fund, or relate directly to the execution of portfolio transactions on behalf of the Fund. As per the terms of the portfolio advisory agreement and portfolio sub-advisory agreements, such soft dollar arrangements are in compliance with applicable laws. During the period, the Fund paid brokerage commissions and other fees of \$72,195 to CIBC WM and \$1,410 to CIBC World Markets Corp. Spreads associated with fixed income and other securities are not ascertainable and, for that reason, cannot be included when determining these amounts.

Fund Transactions

The Fund may enter into one or more of the following transactions (referred to as the *Related Party Transactions*) in reliance on the standing instructions issued by the Independent Review Committee (referred to as the *IRC*):

- invest in or hold equity securities of CIBC or issuers related to a portfolio sub-advisor;
- invest in or hold non-exchange-traded debt securities of CIBC or an issuer related to CIBC, with terms-to-maturity of 365 days or more, issued in a primary offering and in the secondary market;
- make an investment in the securities of an issuer for which CIBC WM, CIBC World Markets Corp., or any affiliate of CIBC (referred to as a *Related Dealer* or the *Related Dealers*) acts as an underwriter during the offering of the securities or at any time during the 60-day period following the completion of the offering of such securities (in the case of a "private placement" offering, in accordance with the Private Placement Relief Order and the policies and procedures relating to such investment);
- purchase equity or debt securities from, or sell them to, a Related Dealer, where it is acting as principal;
- undertake currency and currency derivative transactions where a related party is the counterparty;
- purchase securities from or sell securities to another investment fund or a managed account managed by the Manager or an affiliate (referred to as *inter-fund trades* or *cross-trades*); and
- engage in in-specie transfers by receiving portfolio securities from, or delivering portfolio securities to, a managed account or another investment fund managed by the Manager or an affiliate, in respect of a purchase or redemption of units of the Fund, subject to certain conditions.

At least annually, the IRC reviews the Related Party Transactions for which they have issued standing instructions. The IRC is required to advise the Canadian securities regulatory authorities, after a matter has been referred to or reported to it by the Manager, if it determines that an investment decision was not made in accordance with conditions imposed by securities legislation or the IRC in any Related Party Transactions requiring its approval.

Custodian

CIBC Mellon Trust Company is the custodian of the Fund (referred to as the *Custodian*). The Custodian holds cash and securities for the Fund and ensures that those assets are kept separate from any other cash or securities that the Custodian might be holding. The Custodian also provides other services to the Fund including record-keeping and processing of foreign exchange transactions. The fees and spreads for the services of the Custodian are paid by the Manager. CIBC owns a 50% interest in the Custodian.

Service Provider

CIBC Mellon Global Securities Services Company Inc. (referred to as *CIBC GSS*) provides certain services to the Fund, including securities lending, fund accounting and reporting, and portfolio valuation. Such servicing fees are paid by the Manager. CIBC indirectly owns a 50% interest in CIBC GSS.

⁵ Management expense ratio is based on the total expenses of the fund (excluding commissions and other portfolio transaction costs), incurred by or allocated to a class of units for the period shown, expressed as an annualized percentage of the daily average net asset value of that class during the period. The management expense ratio includes the fees attributable to exchange traded funds.

⁶ The decision to waive management fees is at the discretion of the Manager. The practice of waiving management fees may continue indefinitely or may be terminated at any time without notice to unitholders. The management expense ratio before waivers or absorptions includes the fees attributable to exchange traded funds, where applicable.

⁷ The trading expense ratio represents total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs before income taxes expressed as an annualized percentage of the daily average net asset value during the period. Spreads associated with fixed income securities trading are not ascertainable and, for that reason, are not included in the trading expense ratio calculation. Previously, the trading expense ratio included the fees attributable to exchange traded funds which are now no longer included in the TER. Prior year fees attributable to exchange traded funds have been reclassified to the management expense ratio and management expense ratio before waivers or absorptions.

⁸ The portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the portfolio advisor and/or portfolio sub-advisor manages the portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to a fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the period. The higher a portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by a fund in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.

Management Fees

The Fund pays CAMI an annual management fee to cover the costs of managing the Fund. Management fees are based on the Fund's net asset value and are calculated daily and paid monthly. Management fees are paid to CAMI in consideration for providing, or arranging for the provision of, management, distribution, and portfolio advisory services. Advertising and promotional expenses, office overhead expenses, trailing commissions, and the fees of the portfolio sub-advisor are paid by CAMI out of the management fees received from the Fund. The Fund is required to pay applicable taxes on the management fees paid to CAMI. Refer to the simplified prospectus for the annual management fee rate for each class of units.

For Class O units, the management fee is negotiated with and paid by, or as directed by, unitholders or dealers and discretionary managers on behalf of unitholders. Such Class O management fee will not exceed the Class F unit management fee rate.

The following table shows a breakdown of the services received in consideration of the management fees, as a percentage of the management fees collected from the Fund for the period ended February 29, 2024. These amounts do not include waived fees or absorbed expenses.







Year-by-Year Returns


